Mr. John Donald Maziarz, 73, of 1 Dubis St., Adams, died on Monday May 5, 2008, at Berkshire Medical Center, Pittsfield.

He was born in Pittsfield on August 4, 1934, the son of the late John and Aniela (Fryc) Maziarz. He attended schools in Adams and graduated from the former Adams High School. He then received his Masters in Artistry from Columbia University in New York City.

He was a Veteran of the Vietnam War, having served with the United States Army.

Mr. Maziarz worked as a Art Instructor for over 30 years at the Mount Greylock Regional High School, Williamstown.

He was a communicant of St. Stanislaus Kostka Church, Adams. He was a longtime member of the Mountain Club, St. Stanislaus Kostka Society, and the Adams Lions Club, all of Adams. He was also a member of the Silver Grays and the Massachusetts Art Alumni. He was an avid supporter of Mass Moca, North Adams.

His wife the former Cecilia E. Zawislak, whom he married on November 23, 1961, died on August 28, 2001.

He is survived by;

1 Son - Jeffrey J. Maziarz of Springfield;

1 Daughter - Liane C. Maziarz of Adams, and 1 Grandson - Vale N. Maziarz of Adams.
