



Mr. Kenneth R. Harwood

April 14, 1933 - November 23, 2020

Mr. Kenneth R. Harwood, 87, of Savoy, died Monday afternoon, November 23, 2020, at Craneville Place in Dalton. He was born in Adams on April 14, 1933, a son of the late Archie and Ruth (Kemp) Harwood, and attended Savoy schools. He was a Veteran of the Korean War, serving with Company F, 349th Infantry of the US Army. Ken was a logger and sawyer his whole life, and operated his own sawmill for many years until he retired. He enjoyed hunting, playing the banjo, raising Belgian horses. and was an original member of the Brier Boys. He is survived by his wife of 56 years, the former Isabelle E. Goodermote, whom he married on December 26, 1964; his son, Michael Harwood and his wife, Karen, of Savoy; two daughters, Cindy Blair and her companion, Raffi Abrahamian, of Winter Springs, FL and Joan Harwood and her companion, David Moran of Cheshire; a granddaughter, Clarissa Harwood of Turners Falls; his brother, Donald Harwood of Savoy, as well as several nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his sisters, Edith Miner and Marion Torrey. A graveside funeral service will be held on Saturday, Nov. 28th, at 11:00 AM in Spruce Corner Cemetery, Barnard Rd., Savoy, MA 01256. “ *I first met the Harwood brothers back in 1980 when I needed timbers sawn for my very first timber frame barn project. Arriving at the mill was like stepping into a different world, a slower, kinder, and more picturesque one. Ken was a man of few words, nothing was wasted. He ran the farm, the logging work, and sawmill the same way. The operation would be considered "green" in today's nomenclature so they were either decades ahead of the movement, or were living in the past. Either way, it was a pleasure each time I visited the mill or Ken delivered a load of timbers and boards to one of my jobsites. Ken would always take a few moments to chat at those times, taking an interest in what I was doing, and coming to my barn raisings. Don and his band often played at them as well. I also remember the unfortunate time I inadvertently ran over Ken's old dog who had napped under my truck when I visited the mill. Ken was gracious about it and I will always recall his words: "You didn't know it but you run over my old coon dog!"*

Over the years, I purchased a lot of timber from the mill, perhaps more than anyone. Even after I purchased my own timber stand and started sawing my own stuff, Ken brought over his team of Belgians to pull out my logs. Looking back, I see that he helped influence my direction during the early years of my career. It was a pleasure to have known him.
